NORMA'S NOTES It's been a hugely busy year at HHPR and we are grateful to have been able to hang in here for the animals. Along with a greater than normal number of cats needing help we have had a large group of cats with very serious injuries and illness. Believe me, it is a "jungle out there." We tackle each problem individually and give each cat the care they need to survive. Our small volunteer network of foster homes and adoption center have helped slightly over 150 cats during January to May, 2013 with all medical completed including that most necessary spaying, neutering and Leukemia/AIDS testing.

Over the course of January to May 2013, HHPR paid more than \$13,000 in vet care expenses, over \$3,000 in medical supplies, and nearly \$6,000 operating expenses. We have received \$4,500 in public grants, \$1,500 from the Maine Community Foundation, \$3,000 from the National Federation of Humane Societies and await \$1,000 from Toby's HSUS contest (see page 2). About \$9,000 has been received in public support (that means you). Volunteers raised \$8,000 in fundraising activities – a great deal of hard work in addition to caring for the animals – and \$2,500 came from other sources (adoptions, recycling). We constantly rub two nickels together and somehow come up with the 15 cents we need. Each month, I marvel at all we have accomplished and been able to pay because when we say to our vet, "If he/she can be saved, we want to give this kitty that chance." When I say this I have absolutely no idea where the money will come from – we do it all on faith and our faith has been good to our cats and to our volunteers.

We started new trainings for volunteers and the public: the Itty Bitty Orphan Kitty and Animal Care workshops and the Compassion Fatigue class (story page 2). These were very successful and will be repeated. We received a very pleasant call from Caribou Fire Chief Scott Susi thanking HHPR for cleaning up and relocating the Limestone St. feral cat colony. We removed and tested over 30 cats - several tested positive for Leukemia and AIDS. Over the past 7 or 8 years, several of us worked on the feral colonies in the Access Highway trailer parks. This action brought that population down from over 150 roaming cats to now just 7 which we hope to catch this summer. The Noble's Trailer Park area has also been a targeted site and we have made great progress there.

Haven't seen our Adoption Center at 489 Main St. in Caribou? Stop in. Saturday Noon to 3 pm. These are the public hours so volunteers can do all the direct cat care during the week. Saturday not good? Call Mary Rowe, Volunteer Office Manager at 999-1075 for an appointment.

I close with only one thought - to sincerely thank you, all of you, for everything you do to keep HHPR saving feline lives.

And HHPR has just that, a great group of volunteers...from the very young children who want to play with the cats to the retirees that spend their personal time finding homes for these wonderful cats. Everyone has their niche and everyone has a purpose but our main goal, together, is to find a forever home for each and every cat that comes through our doors."





Farewell Friends





ITTY BITTY ORPHAN KITTY PROGRAM

Each spring we see dozens of orphan kittens in need of special care with never have enough skilled hands to care for them. HHPR recently conducted an educational series called "Itty Bitty Orphan Kitty" with the hope to: (1) encourage new volunteers; (2) educate the general public; (3) and to encourage, educate and support our very valued HHPR volunteers. The workshops were divided into 3 sessions. Session 1, facilitated by Anne Price, RN retired, focused on the very young orphaned kittens and the massive amount of time and energy necessary to keep these little babies alive without a mother to guide them. Session 2 was facilitated by Dr. Andrea Pesut, DVM who focused her workshop on how volunteers can help recognize early symptoms of illness and the need for advanced medical care. Dr. Pesut also went into detail on the various diseases that can be communicated from cat to human, as well as feline contagious illness most likely to occur in shelter situations. Session 3 focused on Compassion Fatigue which is nationally recognized and lists humane shelter workers and volunteers as a career having one of the highest burn-out rates. This session was facilitated by Ms. Sharon Berz, LMSW-cc of the Aroostook Area Agency on Aging.





Life at Halfway Home Pet Rescue (HHPR) is looking much better for this young Momma Cass than it did a few weeks ago. A young girl was taking the garbage outside to the garbage barrels when she heard a soft pitiful cry. Looking over the barrel at the ice still between the garage building and the garbage cans where the sun can't reach, she saw little Momma Cass frozen in the ice with her 5 young kittens. Reacting quickly, she got her parents and they quickly started thawing out the ice to release the momma and 5 babies. Unfortunately,

4 of the babies could not be revived. The family soon brought the feline family to HHPR for more help.

Momma Cass and little Rocky were treated with eye ointment and antibiotics during their recovery and are now slowly gaining weight and energy after their near death experience.

This family is a hero to the HHPR volunteers as they postponed their day's tasks to save the



lives of this feline family. Momma Cass also took over the care and feeding of four orphan kittens. She is extremely loving and grateful for her rescue.

NEED HELP WITH SPAY/ NEUTER?

The Help Fix ME Program currently has money to continue helping low-income families have their cats sterilized. The portion you would pay for a cat is \$10. Call the number below and get your form in to them as soon as possible.

You will qualify for Help Fix ME if you receive: food stamps, TANF, Mainecare, SSI or SSD or have an income below 133% of the federal poverty level (you do not have to be receiving any government assistance to qualify).

Funds are available for the sterilization of cats and pitbull breed dogs to reduce the number of unwanted animals in shelters.

which concerned us all about underlying medical conditions. But, his medical tests proved this mini-kitty was a survivor! His digestive system was just a bit underdeveloped and all he needed was time. This was something we could arrange.

Marmalade was given the usual TLC from volunteers and then appeared his foster mom, Stacey - love at first sight – big surprise. Marmalade's progress was a certainty once he was in his foster home. Of course, the foster home



soon became his permanent home. As you can see from the photo, this is one true happy ending!

MILESTONE CELEBRATED

In April we did intake number 1,000 – a cat in desperate need of care who we named Harry. Harry is a neutered, declawed adult male who was basically thrown out to fend for himself. The Fort Fairfield Police brought this terribly ill cat to HHPR. He was nothing but skin and bone but obviously wanted to live and be loved.

Harry received immediate care but after several days he was still not gaining weight. After further evaluation and medical attention, it was determined that Harry had a hyperactive thyroid gland. We had a few options, but the only one that we felt was the best for him was surgery. We opted to have that gland surgically removed so that Harry could at last have some sort of life. He has recovered from the surgery but still needs to gain weight, which will take time and lots of TLC.
