### Where did the summer go?



I just shoveled the last shovel of snow in May and then I blinked and that was our short, wet summer. Now the cucumbers are fully blossomed but the frost has already hit.

It was a summer of making plans, construction, saving babies, and an avalanche of seriously ill and severely

injured adult cats coming to us the entire summer. Vet medical bills soared.

To keep the renovation of the warehouse going for the clinic, and to protect the healthy adoption center cats by not exposing them to the ill cats, we emptied my living room and put all the ill and injured cats in the living room and in my bedroom. I was allowed to keep my bed and a chair.

As a volunteer family, we welcomed the **Sewall Founda**tion representatives with a light luncheon, thanking them for their wonderful donation of \$100,000 toward the building construction costs and \$40,000 for the continued success of the Free Spay/Neuter Cat Clinic and Low-Cost Dog and Cat Vaccination Clinic. We also received another \$15,000 from the Maine Community Foundation to add to the Free Spay/Neuter Fund. We received many other valued donations from individuals including a generous \$15,000 from Glen and Rita Levasseur of Sabattus, \$6,000 from Bill Kelley of Fort Fairfield (\$3,000 in memory of his wife, Bree, who was an animal rescuer her entire life, \$2,000 in honor of Al Morin of Fort Fairfield for his care of needy animals and \$1,000 in honor of the dedicated Halfway Home Pet Rescue volunteers).

On the down side, we suddenly found we had to completely rebuild the underground water and sewer lines and complete some roof repair due to the snow damage around a chimney, but gratefully this was all accomplished even though it was the busiest time of year for the businesses who helped us. It has been a community of support with business people trying to squeeze our needs in whenever they could.

Feline only surgical clinic includes: Exam, Spay/Neuter, Distemper and Rabies. Microchip is available for an extra \$30.

#### **DECEMBER 7, 2023 from 2:30 to 6 pm**

Dog/cat Low-cost Wellness Clinic: Free Exam, distemper \$20, rabies \$20, parasite treatment \$20, ear mite treatment \$20, Roundworm & Tapeworm treatment (Drontal tablets) \$20, Microchip is an extra \$30.

#### **DECEMBER 8, 9, 10, 2023**

Feline only surgical clinic includes: Exam, Spay/Neuter, Distemper and Rabies. Microchip is available for an extra \$30.

Services are free but we are asking those who can to make a donation. Please consider donating \$50 for females or \$35 for males. If you can't afford to donate, we will still fix your cat. This will help us provide clinics into Spring 2024.

Maine Help Fix Me is not providing any funding to subsidize the costs of the clinics.

#### Norma's Notes cont.

We had 6 clinics in the spring of 2023. We spayed/neutered 600 cats for Aroostook County including many from feral cat colonies. We also were able to give routine health care to close to 350 County dogs and cats. The State Help Fix Me program did help us with 60 vouchers for the 600 surgeries in the Spring. They have notified us that the program is out of money so they will not provide any vouchers this Fall. However, we will continue with the mission knowing our higher power will help us find a way. This will give us a total of 9 clinics for the **year 2023.** Hopefully the end will show at least 1,100 to 1,200 free spay/neuters. With winter storms and dangerous road conditions we do not plan any winter clinics but will start back up again for May, June, and July.

I look back at all that has been accomplished for these precious but helpless animals and I am so grateful to our financial supporters. Without you this mission would not be possible. You are our solid foundation of compassionate care for homeless, helpless pets just as our volunteers are the loving hands that serve them.

Dear sweet Philip (estimated to be 12+ years) came to HHPR in a feral trap. We neutered and did a wellness exam and had his eyes checked. After 7 years of living under a porch crawl space and impregnating the resident females, Philip now knew he had some better choices. He allowed his loving nature to spark the trust of HHPR volunteers. It was quickly apparent that **Philip was not a true feral**, but had been forced to fend for himself as best as he could. Philip did not belong in a feral barn as a rodent patroller so we waited for him to find his FAVORITE choice of a forever home.

A follow-up medical check-up at the Kindred Spirits Clinic in Orrington determined that Philip does have perfect vision, but suffers from an untreated eye injury from his youth. Philip checked out his new life options and soon applied for the job of Assistant Office Manager at the **R.L. Todd Electrical Company in Caribou**. He does a good job of managing Amy and is slowly





teaching her that the desk should be clear of all papers (which should obviously be on the floor). He is still working on reorganizing Tim's desk.

Philip does an excellent job of greeting all customers as well as guarding each doorway from clients without appointments. No one gets past Philip without the required password, "Good Kitty."

According to Philip's schedule, it is always 5 'clock somewhere and time for his seventh nap of an exhausting day. Supervising employees and convincing each that he is still hungry is a tough job and requires one dinner per employee if they want to go home without guilt. **Drop in to meet Philip at R.L. ## The Halfway Home Pet Rescue Mission is changing

**Norma Milton, President/Founder of Halfway Home Pet Rescue (HHPR)** has given notice for slowing down her volunteer work activities for the pet rescue. The HHPR Board of Directors has been in the process of revising work responsibilities including having both volunteer and BOD members to pick up many of Norma's previous tasks. The dedication and commitment toward the animals of Aroostook County will continue with some changes of activities.

HHPR volunteers have noticed a definite change in the needs of residents and their pets. For many years we concentrated on rescuing stray, surrendered and feral colonies due to huge cat over-population in the County area. The over-population of County cats is still an issue but it is not the biggest issue after the years of our Free Spay/Neuter Clinics.

Although the clinics have **decreased the number of cats** coming into area shelters, we have found there is still a huge problem with responsible **owners not being able to access quality vet care** for their pets. Some families have to be on a waiting list for up to 1 ½ years before their new kitten/puppy can have its first vet wellness exam and needed shots. Families with a loved pet with a serious illness or major injury has the same urgent issue—no vet care. To get emergency vet care one must travel 3 ½ hours one way to a Bangor Emergency Clinic. **This is unacceptable**. Fortunately, our **Mobile Vet Clinic, Dr. Elizabeth Stone, of Community Cat S/N of Topsham,** has agreed to add approximately 6 hours of time the day before the 3-day surgical clinic to do community routine pet wellness care.

Norma will remain as President involved only as intake specialist and grant/newsletter writer.

**IMPORTANT NEWS FOR DOG OWNERS:** The Central Aroostook Humane Society in Presque Isle is offering a dog spay/neuter clinic during the first week of December. Call Betsy at 207-764-3441 for more information and an application.
